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Using IOS to Create Competitive Advantage

• <u>Comparative Efficiency</u>: allows an organization to produce its goods or services more cheaply than its competitors through internal efficiency and interorganizational efficiency.

- Improving internal efficiency:

- Lower inventory costs by allowing "JIT" delivery.
- Encourage standardization of data representation, making data easier to manipulate and analyze internally.
- Capture data more quickly, leading to faster analysis and shorter response time.

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- Improving interorganizational efficiency:

- "Export work" by getting customers or suppliers to do data entry and editing
- Allow customers to "shop" and check order status electronically, without tying up customer service representatives
- Provide benefits of vertical integration (more control, coordination, lower costs) without requiring actual ownership of the organizations
- Facilitate cross-selling or up-selling of additional or higher margin products

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Using IOS to Create Competitive Advantage - Improving interorganizational efficiency: • Permit inexpensive, rapid electronic transmission of sales and service messages • Increase sales of company products, due to ease and efficiency of ordering and to favorable display on order-entry screens • Remove a level of the distribution chain by going direct to customer or user rather than through an intermediary • Capture more precise, timely usage data allowing production, scheduling according to use rather than according to sale or shipment. - Improving interorganizational efficiency:

- Evaluate quickly and economically the effects of advertising, rebates, and other marketing programs
- Extend market reach to customers who could not be economically served by conventional field sales calls
- Relate sales message, including price and other terms, to buyer's previous experience with seller and with product
- Ship in more economical lots and be prepared to receive incoming goods by communicating with transportation companies

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Using IOS to Create Competitive Advantage
 Improving interorganizational efficiency:

 Deliver products or services electronically, monitor compliance with policies related to customers, dealers, etc.
 Observe ordering pattern for and usage of, competitors' products

 Bargaining Power: allows a firm to resolve bargaining situations with its customers and suppliers to its own advantage through search-related costs, unique product
 features, and switching costs.

• **Bargaining Power**:

- Lowering search-related costs:
 - Lower cost of "shopping" via links to suppliers; control, observe, or profit from shopping via links to customers.
 - Improve customers' ability to shop for a third-party product that generates fee income or additional sales of primary product.
 - Suggest alternative product specifications that reduce customers' costs of improve customers' performance
 - Get the best available prices on purchased materials.
 - Alert customer to opportunities to obtain volume

discounts by altering order patterns slightly.

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• **Bargaining Power**:

- Raising switching costs:

- Raise users' need to retrain personnel, to modify operating procedures, or to invest in new or additional hardware or software if they change to a different system.
- Provide summary reports and other functions to users.
- Threaten change in status of personnel if automated system is replaced by non-automated system.

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Internet Changes the Way You Compete (2000)
Extranet replaces VAN for IOS services.
Switching costs related to retraining and hardware/software change are almost nil.
Inter-organizational connection is low cost and easy using Internet.
More free services can be provided to users to increase the switching cost.
One to one marketing can prevail.
User-personalized web front and push technology become the norm.

2. Adopt the new philosophy of total quality.

- Quality comes first and everyone must join in.
- All Corporate management must embrace TQM and clearly communicate their support of this concept to all members in the software development team.

3. Cease dependence on mass inspection to achieve quality.

- Quality is built in, not added on.
- Management must install job training and incentive programs to continually improve software

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development processes.

14 Points in Software Process
 4. End the practice of awarding business based on price tag alone.
 Do not award a software contract based on price tag.
 This better to create long-term relationship with a few loyal and trustworthy outsourcing contractors who can produce quality code for your system.
 5. Improve constantly and forever the systems of production and service.
 Introduce new and working methodology, paradigm, standards, practices, techniques, tools, policies, and procedures into software development process.
 Update or expand project member's skill set.

6. Institute training on the job.

- Management must assess the skill level of an employee before he or she is assigned to a software project.
- All project members must know what their jobs entail and how to do their work.

7. Institute leadership.

- Management must lead, not punish.
- It is manager's job to help MIS staff do a better job and create a better system.

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Focus on the member whose performance is out of statistical control

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14 Points in Software Process
 8. Drive out fear of job insecurity.
 - Employees must feel secure before they are willing to ask questions, make suggestions, or even expose their weaknesses by asking for help.
 - Establish long-term employment policy.
 9. Break down barriers between departments or staff areas.
 - Open communication among functional areas and general knowledge across disciplines are necessary for a successful system implementation.
 - Provide appropriate education and training for team members to change their behavior and improve their

10. Eliminate slogans, exhortations, and targets for the workforce.

- MIS management should post their progress in responding to suggestions and in helping the staff improve quality. Let the employees put up their own signs and slogans
- 11. Eliminate numerical quotas, goals, and work standards.
 - Let the project members put up their own goals. Managers should concentrate on helping people do a better job by reducing rework, errors, and waste. Everyone must work toward constant improvement,

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14. Put everyone to work to accomplish the transformation.

- Put employees to work. All of us must identify our customers in order to determine precisely what our jobs are. Everyone belongs to a team, to work in the Plan-Do-Check-Act cycle, to address one or more specific issues, to find special causes detected by statistical signals.
- Put management to work. Only management can change the culture and environment that dominate any individual's performance. They must explain to a critical mass of people in the organization why change is necessary and that the change will involve

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Recommendations

- Everyone related to the value chain of the product are significant and must use one's mind constantly to play his or her own role well, otherwise, the chain will be broken, and the TQM process will soon fall apart. Incentive program is the key.
- Break down large organization into smaller manageable groups of 30 persons per group for TQM implementation. Software development team typically has a size that lend itself to TQM implementation. WMU GIMBA BUS 6180 Ch.5: IT MSP p.129
